Academics

The College will be implementing a nationally recognized Kubota Technician Training Program. SCCC plans to launch the training series in the Fall of 2025. Students will receive training and certification in diesel and gasoline small engines, hydraulics, electrical, and suspension systems.

The College's Building Construction Trades program recently received the 2024 New Jersey Historic Preservation Award for its work in the ongoing retrofit and restoration of Horton Mansion.

The designs for developing the campus learning commons are complete, and the project is currently out to bid. It aims to create a dedicated space on campus that brings together all academic support services for students.

The College's Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) Dept. will host high school students for an immersive STEM Day experience on the College's campus, with varied workshops designed to expose students to many programs and careers in the STEM industry.
